Corpus Christi: An Introduction

The Solemnity of Corpus Christi or The Day of Thanksgiving for the Institution of Holy Communion, is kept on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday. This feast originated in France in the mid-thirteenth century and was extended to the whole Church by Pope Urban IV in 1264. This feast calls us to focus on two manifestations of the Body of Christ, the Holy Eucharist and the Church. The primary purpose of this feast is to focus our attention on the Eucharist. The opening prayer at Mass calls our attention to Jesus' suffering and death and our worship of Him, especially in the Eucharist and of course, at every Mass our focus is the Eucharist and the Real Presence of Christ in it. The secondary focus of this feast is upon the Body of Christ as it is present in the Church. The Church is called the Body of Christ because of the intimate communion which Jesus shares with his disciples. He expresses this in the gospels by using the metaphor of a body in which He is the head. This image helps keep in focus both the unity and the diversity of the Church.

Here at the Mass (the gathering) we are afforded once more the opportunity not to remember the Last Supper, but to be present at the Cross - and in 'calling to mind His precious death upon the cross' (Common Worship, Eucharistic Prayer B) until His coming again. This is no re-enactment of the Lord's Last Supper, rather it is in obedience to His command to 'do this in remembrance of me' - here we are caught up into the mystery of God's own time and by remembering we make real His presence by means of sacramental blessing. Thus we are fed both spiritually and corporally as we take Christ out into the world from here within us - so just as our service ends our service must begin. This is the gift of the Eucharist and the very gift of God.

The service concludes with a Procession around the church followed by Benediction. The procession is an act of mission and echoes the walk of the disciples to Emmaus (Luke 24.13-35) as we walk with Christ who walks with us, breaks bread for us and who causes our hearts to burn within us in recognition of his presence. The President carries the Sacrament in a monstrance and incense is used to signify the dignity and holiness of the presence of Christ with us. The Benediction is a blessing using the Blessed Sacrament making the sign of the cross over us and the world.

The word monstrance comes from the Latin monstrare, meaning 'to show'. The challenge of Corpus Christi and every celebration of the Eucharist is how we ourselves become 'walking monstrances', showing forth the presence of Christ in our world and in our lives.

Reader A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians.




listen as we pray for all whom you have given us,

your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ.



And so, Father, calling to mind his death on the cross, his perfect sacrifice made once for the sins of the whole world;







rejoicing in his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption. As we offer you this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, we bring before you this bread and this cup and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you.

Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of the Blessed Virgin Mary, St Nicolas, St George, St Catherine, St Benedict all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord; by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever.

The Blessed Sacrament is placed in the Monstrance.

Incense is brought and the altar party genuflects. The Blessed Sacrament is censed. The Humeral Veil is placed on the President who takes the Monstrance holding it with the Humeral Veil.

Procession & Hymn 310

The procession of the Sacrament is led by the Cross and Acolytes from the High Altar around the Church. The Pascal Candle is extinguished during Benediction. Once the procession returns and the Sacrament is revered on the High Altar, the Pascal candle is re-lit.







Benediction Blessing

When the procession reaches the Quire Altar, the Blessed Sacrament is placed on the Quire altar and the Rector and altar party kneel. After a period of adoration the president stands whilst the Blessed Sacrament is censed and $HYMN\ 268\ verses\ 5\ \&\ 6$ is sung.

Therefore we, before Him bending, This great sacrament revere: Types and shadows have their ending, For the newer rite is here; Faith, our outward sense befriending, Makes the inward vision clear.
